Director Omar Ahmad called the meeting to order at 2:16 p.m.

Approval of Minutes of Community Relations Committee (CRC) Meeting of September 8, 2010

The committee approved the minutes (Lloyd/Tissier).

Designation of October as Disabilities Awareness Month

Director Ahmad said staff is asking the Board to designate October as Disabilities Awareness Month. The District has been a leader in serving people with disabilities who live, work, and travel in San Mateo County. The District created Redi-Wheels in 1978 exclusively to serve customers with disabilities.

The Committee (Lloyd/Tissier) unanimously recommended Board acceptance of the motion.

Director Ahmad and Chair Rose Guilbault presented the proclamation to Jim Engvall, member of the San Mateo County Commission on Disabilities.

Public Comment

Jerry Grace, San Lorenzo, said Mr. Engvall is a great person and he is very happy he accepted the proclamation for all his great work.

Accessibility Update

Accessibility Coordinator Tina DuBost said the Paratransit Coordinating Council (PCC) held its annual driver and staff appreciation dinner last night.

PCC Update

PCC Chair Nancy Keegan introduced Dr. Michal Foriest Settles, Chair of the Coastside PCC, who gave a presentation titled "A Day in the Life of a RediCoast Rider." Dr. Settles made the following points:

- RediCoast service started in 2004 and serves Pacifica to Pescadero.
- There are 255 people registered for this service.



- Seventy-eight percent of the riders are ambulatory.
- Over half of the riders live in Half Moon Bay.
- The three agencies that compose the Coastside PCC are Coastside Adult Health Center, Half Moon Bay Peninsula Diversified Network and Senior Coastsiders.
- The Board was thanked for their policies and foresight to allow residents on the coast to live productive and meaningful lives.
- Director Zoe Kersteen-Tucker was thanked for her inspiration and long standing support for the San Mateo coastal communities.

Director Karyl Matsumoto asked which agencies are non-profit. Dr. Settles said they all are non-profit.

Director Kersteen-Tucker acknowledged all those present who work so hard on the RediCoast service.

Citizens Advisory Committee (CAC) Liaison Report

CAC Chair John Baker reported on the October meeting:

- CAC member Ken Feldstein's passing is a great loss to the CAC.
- Marketing Manager Pat Boland gave a presentation on Clipper. There were many
 concerns and questions among the members. He also gave a presentation on the
 upcoming changes to the new SamTrans website.
- Members had concerns about overcrowding on Routes 390 and 391.

Public Comment

Pat Giorni, Burlingame, said Executive Officer Public Affairs Mark Simon informed her that the review of the Pico Gate situation had been completed, but because of other staff concerns this item has been put on hold. Ms. Giorni asked if a meeting could be facilitated to discuss this issue that has been going on for 10 months.

Gladwyn d'Souza, Belmont, said by closing the Pico Gate it is forcing people onto Redwood Shores Parkway.

General Manager/CEO Michael Scanlon said there will be an update on the Pico Gate issue by Mr. Simon during the General Manager's report.

Performance Report – ADA Paratransit Services

Director of Bus Transportation Chester Patton provided the following information:

- Average weekday ridership ranges between 950-1,000 trips per day.
- Trip denials remain at zero on a monthly average of 29,000 trip requests.
- On-time performance is above the 90 percent standard.
- Average weekday ridership on RediCoast is about 100 trips per day.
- On-time performance is 100 percent.
- In July 2010, the base paratransit fare and agency-sponsored group fares were increased.
- In Fiscal Year 2010, 875 comments were received, of which 53 percent were compliments.
- There are just over 6,800 people certified for Redi-Wheels.
- The average cost for Redi-Wheels is \$40.20 per trip.
- This program is an unfunded mandate by the government.



Public Comment

Jerry Grace, San Lorenzo, said people don't have the money for this service and fares cannot continue to be raised.

Multimodal Ridership Report – August 2010

Mr. Patton said there was an 8.5 percent decline in bus ridership due to the fare increase, service cuts and the recession. Summer Youth Pass (SYP) sales decreased which could have been affected by the increase in cost of the pass and the reduction of summer schools. Paratransit is up 2 percent and Caltrain is up 2 percent. Overall ridership was down 3.3 percent for August and year-to-date is down 4.3 percent.

Public Comment

Jerry Grace, San Lorenzo, asked if the SYP is a sticker or a pass. He asked, when Clipper is launched, will there still be a youth pass or will people have an identification card like a disabled card.

Executive Officer Customer Service and Marketing Rita Haskin said the Clipper card is active on five systems and is currently being tested on SamTrans. Clipper is scheduled to go live on SamTrans on December 15.

SIGNIFICANCE

Several groups advise SamTrans on accessible service issues. The Paratransit Coordinating Council (PCC) provides a forum for consumer input on paratransit issues. The Advocacy and Legislative Committee (AL-Com) is the advocacy arm of the PCC. The SamTrans Accessibility Advisory Committee (formerly the Americans with Disabilities Act Technical Advisory Committee or ATAC) is a SamTrans committee that advises on accessibility issues, particularly related to fixed-route service. Each group has requested that the Board be informed of the issues discussed at meetings.

The PCC meets monthly (except for August). The SamTrans Accessibility Advisory Committee (SAAC) meets every two months. The PCC Advocacy meetings are now being held on a quarterly basis.

The minutes from the October 5 Al-Com meeting, the October 12 PCC meeting and the most recent SAAC meeting are not yet available. The October Al-Com and PCC meeting minutes will be included in next month's packet.

SIGNIFICANCE

Table "A" summarizes the average weekday ridership (AWR) statistics for all modes of transportation for which SamTrans is responsible. Chart "A" compares AWR for Fiscal Year 2009, FY2010, FY2011 and year-to-date comparisons of FY2010 vs. FY2011.

Table "A" also provides the average weekday ridership of the BART SFO Extension as a separate line.

MONTHLY RIDERSHIP HIGHLIGHTS—SEPTEMBER 2010 COMPARED TO SEPTEMBER 2009

All Modes – AWR of 99,541, a decrease of 3.7 percent.

Bus – AWR of 49,550, a decrease of 9.0 percent.

Paratransit - AWR of 1,130, a decrease of 1.8 percent.

Caltrain - AWR of 41,310, an increase of 3.8 percent.

Caltrain Shuttles - AWR of 5,562, a decrease of 8.0 percent.

BART Shuttles - AWR of 1,989, an increase of 3.7 percent.

SamTrans Activities and Promotions:

The SamTrans Marketing Department continues to implement a number of programs and activities to attract customers. The activities for the month included:

- **Labor Day ad** In partnership with Amalgamated Transit Union 1574, SamTrans ran a "Happy Labor Day" ad in the San Mateo County Labor newspaper.
- Youth Focusing on increasing ridership to the 70-plus schools it serves from elementary to college SamTrans wrapped up its youth promotion in September. The program included a series of bilingual newspaper ads, information provided to schools, a news release, youth-oriented information on the SamTrans website and messages posted to the SamTrans Youth Facebook page.

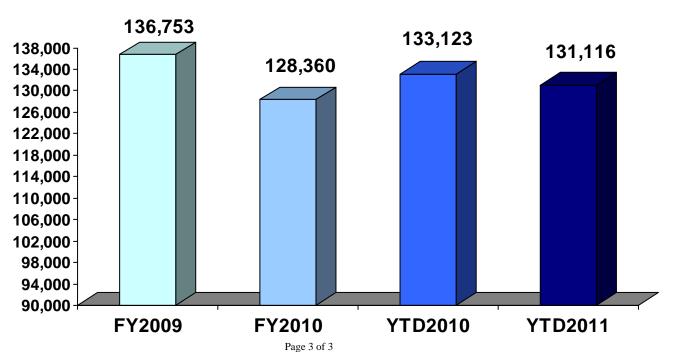

SUBJECT: STATEMENT OF REVENUES AND EXPENSES FOR THE PERIOD

ENDING JUNE 30, 2010 - UNAUDITED

ACTION

Staff proposes the Committee recommend that the Board accept and enter into the record the Statement of Revenues and Expenses for the year ended June 2010.

SIGNIFICANCE

Year End Revenues – **Unaudited:** *Total Revenues* (page 1, line 12) for Fiscal Year 2010 are **better** than revised budget by \$2.0 million or 1.5 percent. Within total revenue, **Local TDA and STA Funds** (page 1, line 2) are **better** than revised budget by \$0.7 million or 2.8 percent. **Operating Grants** (page 1, line 4) are **better** than revised budget by \$3.7 million or 55.3 percent. **Other Interest, Rent and Other Income** (page 1, line 10) is **better** than revised budget by \$0.3 million or 4.5 percent. These positive variances are offset by **Passenger Fares** (page 1, line 1) which are **worse** than revised budget by \$0.2 million or 1.3 percent. **Measure A Contribution** and **AB434 Funds** (page 1, line 5) are **worse** than revised budget by \$0.2 million or 2.6 percent. **District ½ Cent Sales Tax** (page 1, line 8) is **worse** than revised budget by \$1.5 million or 2.5 percent. **Investment Interest** (page 1, line 9) is **worse** than revised budget by \$0.7 million or 12.1 percent.

Compared to Fiscal Year 2009, *Total Revenues* (page 1, line 12) are \$2.5 million or 1.9 percent *better*. The principal components of this change includes an *increase* in *Operating Grants* (page 1, line 4) of \$3.8 million or 58.4 percent and an *increase* in *Measure A Contribution and AB434 Funds* (page 1, line 5) of \$3.8 million or 77.2 percent offset by a *decrease* in *Local TDA and STA funds* (page 1, line 2) of \$5.0 million or 15.5 percent and a *decrease* in *District ½ Cent Sales Tax* (page 1, line 8) of \$1.5 million or 2.5 percent.

Year End Expenditures - Unaudited: *Total Expenses* (page 4, line 75) for Fiscal Year 2010 are *better* than the annual revised budget by \$7.4 million or 5.6 percent. Within total expenses, *Total Motor Bus* (page 3, line 48) is *better* than revised budget by \$6.5 million or 6.7 percent. *Total ADA Programs* are *better* than revised budget by \$0.8 million or 5.6 percent. *Total Multi-*

Modal Programs are better than revised budget by \$0.1 million or 0.3 percent. Compared to Fiscal Year 2009, Total Expenses (page 4, line 75) are \$5.2 million or 4.0 percent better. The principal components of this change include a decrease in Total Motor Bus (page 3, line 48) of \$4.6 million or 4.8 percent, a decrease in Total ADA Programs (page 4, line 57) of \$0.7 million or 5.2 percent and an increase in Total Multi-Modal Prgrams (page 4, line 73) of \$0.1 million or 0.7 percent.

During the year Stafff made a concentrated effort to reduce costs. This resulted in savings of which \$2.8 million has been included in the FY2011 adopted Operating Budget.

Budget Revision: The annual revised budget for *Capital Program* line items (page 1, lines 13, 14 and 30) have been adjusted to reflect actual capital spending during FY2010. The remaining capital budget has been rolled over to FY2011.

Fiscal Year End Results: Staff will update this report and distribute it in conjunction with the FY2010 Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR), which will include the results of the annual external audit.

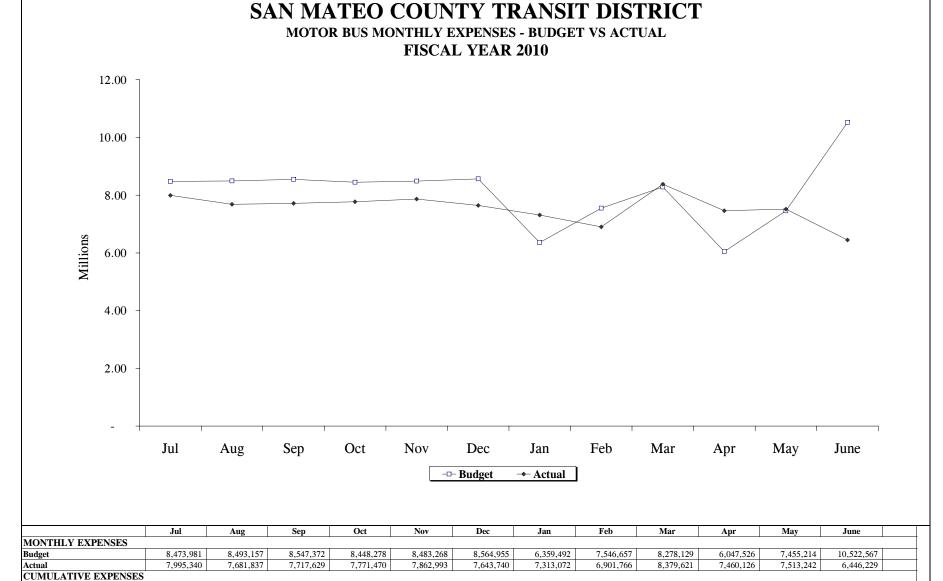

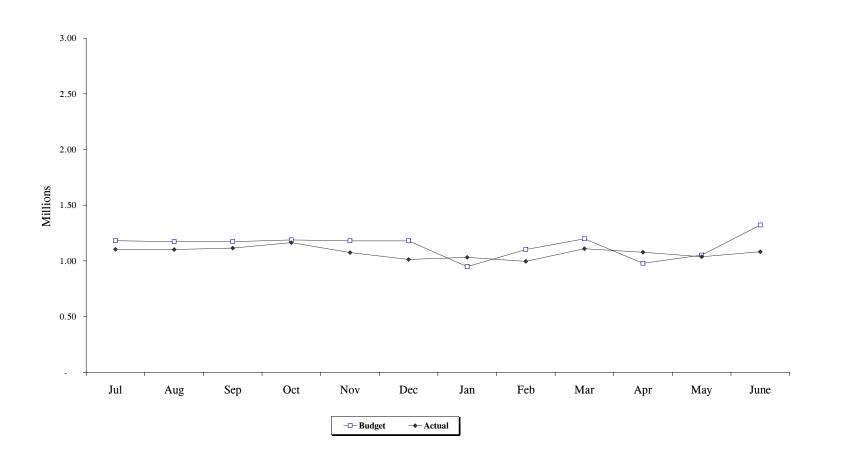

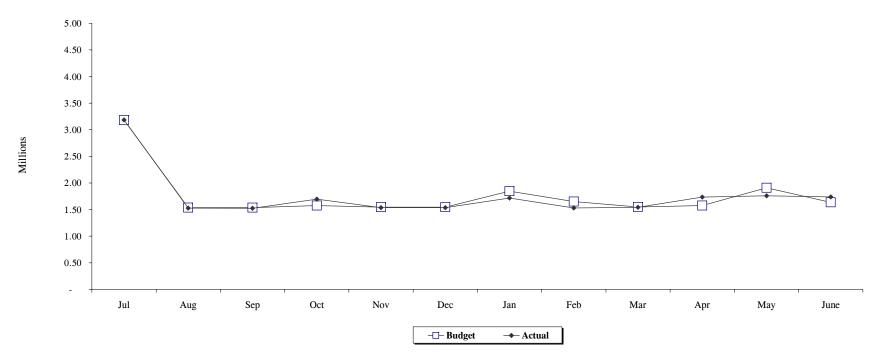
ADA PROGRAM MONTHLY EXPENSES - BUDGET VS ACTUAL FISCAL YEAR 2010

ACTION

Staff proposes the Committee recommend that the Board accept and enter into the record the Statement of Revenues and Expenses for the month of September 2010 and supplemental information.

SIGNIFICANCE

Revenues: Total Revenues (page 1, line 12) are \$269,561 or 0.7 percent worse than revised budget. Passenger Fares (page 1, line 1) are worse than budget by \$118,645 or 2.8 percent, Operating Grants & Others (page 1, line 3) are worse than budget by \$293,912 or 71.2 percent, Investment Interest (page 1, line 8) is worse than budget by \$140,957 or 13.5 percent offset by Other Interest, Rent & Other Income (page 1, line 10) which is better than budget by \$283,991 or 20.9 percent.

Expenses: *Total Expenses* (page 4, line 74) are \$3,259,056 or 9.4 percent *better* than revised budget. Within *Total Expenses*, *Total Motor Bus* (page 3, line 47) is *better* than budget by \$2,829,868 or 11.4 percent, *Total ADA Programs* (page 4, line 56) are *better* than budget by \$417,097 or 11.7 percent and *Total Multimodal* Programs (page 4, line 72) are *better* than budget by \$12,090 or 0.2 percent.

Budget Amendments: There are no budget amendments for the month of September 2010.

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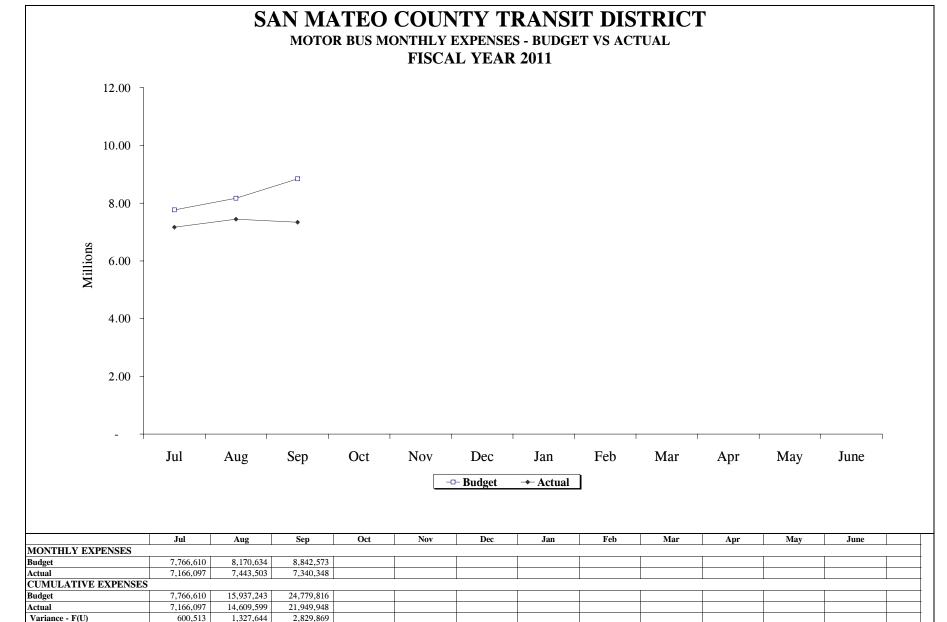

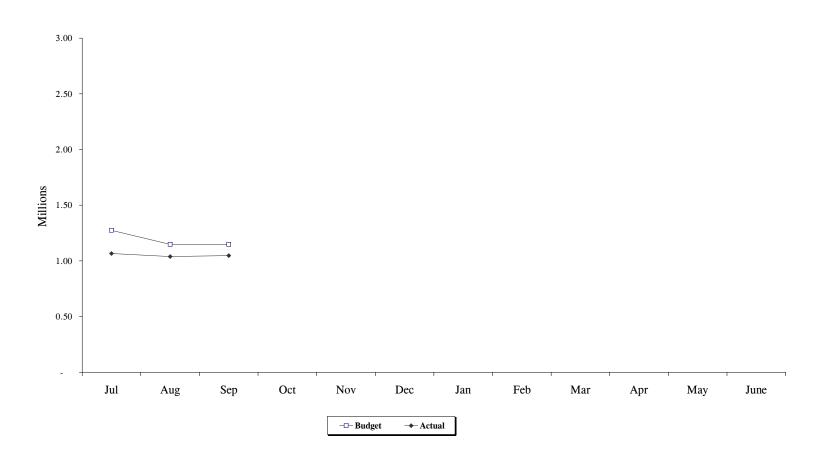

ACTION

Staff proposes that the Committee recommend that the Board accept and enter into the record the Quarterly Investment Report and Fixed Income Market Review and Outlook for the quarter ended September 30, 2010.

SIGNIFICANCE

The District Investment Policy contains a requirement for a quarterly report to be transmitted to the Board within 30 days of the end of the quarter. This staff report was forwarded to the Board of Directors under separate cover on October 20, 2010 in order to meet the 30-day requirement.

BUDGET IMPACT

There is no impact on the budget.

BACKGROUND

The San Mateo County Transit District ("District") is required by state law to submit quarterly reports within 30 days of the end of the quarter covered by the report. The report is required to include the following information:

- 1. Type of investment, issuer, date of maturity, par and dollar amount invested in all securities, investments and money held by the local agency;
- 2. Description of any of the local agency's funds, investments or programs that are under the management of contracted parties, including lending programs;
- 3. For all securities held by the local agency or under management by any outside party that is not a local agency or the State of California Local Agency Investment Fund (LAIF), a current market value as of the date of the report and the source of this information:
- 4. Statement that the portfolio complies with the Investment Policy or the manner in which the portfolio is not in compliance; and,

5. Statement that the local agency has the ability to meet its pool's expenditure requirements (cash flow) for the next six months or provide an explanation as to why sufficient money shall or may not be available.

A schedule, which addresses the requirements of 1, 2, and 3 above, is included in this report on pages 6 and 7. The schedule separates the investments into three groups: The Investment Portfolio which is managed by CSI Capital Management, Inc. ("CSI"); Liquidity funds which are managed by District staff; and Trust funds which are managed by a third party trustee. The Investment Policy governs the management and reporting of the Investment Portfolio and Liquidity funds while the bond covenants govern the management and reporting of the Trust funds.

CSI provides the District a current market valuation of all the assets under its management for each quarter. The valuation is provided by FT Interactive Data, the major operating division of Interactive Data Corporation, ("IDC"). IDC is a leading provider of global securities data. They offer one of the largest information databases with current and historical prices on securities traded in all major markets including daily evaluations for more than 2.5 million fixed income securities.

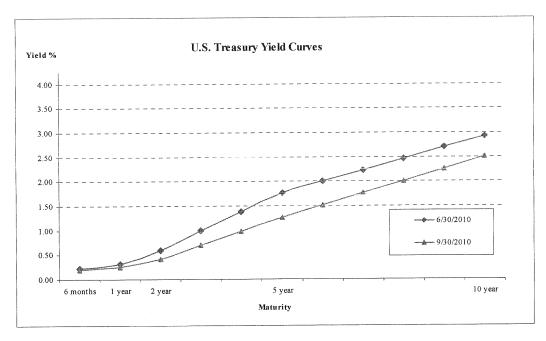
Due to the nature of securities which are bought and sold in a principal market, such as fixed income securities, multiple market values may exist for a given security at any given time. CSI has chosen IDC as an unbiased estimator of these prices based on their leading role as a provider of end of the day pricing, an evaluation of their methodology and the experience of their evaluation staff. Unfortunately, given the recent volatility in the markets, not every security is currently supported or accurately reflected by IDC. Therefore at the end of the quarter, CSI surveyed a number of Wall Street firms to get an accurate market value of the securities held in the District's portfolio. These surveys reflect the levels at which someone is actually willing to purchase the securities held by the District. In the case of money market instruments, which are not supported by IDC, CSI used adjusted cost.

The Liquidity funds managed by District staff are considered to be cash equivalents and therefore market value is considered to be equal to book value, (i.e. cost). The shares of beneficial interest generally establish a nominal value per share. Because the Net Asset Value is fixed at a nominal value per share, book and market value are equal and rate of income is recalculated on a daily basis.

The portfolio and this Quarterly Investment Report comply with the Investment Policy and the provisions of SB 564 (1995). The District has the ability to meet its expenditure requirements for the next six months.

DISCUSSION

Market Review and Outlook

Amidst only modest fanfare, the National Bureau of Economic Research recently declared that the worst economic recession since the Great Depression officially ended in June of 2009. Since then, our economy has managed to see modest improvement thanks in large part to outsized stimulus measures. Notably absent has been any meaningful improvement in either the residential housing market or the ranks of the unemployed. Given the critical nature of these markets in the proper functioning of our economy, many have deemed this recovery a disappointment.

To be fair, it is important to make the distinction between a *contraction* and a *crisis*. Contractions are regular occurrences with modest setbacks and fairly rapid recoveries. Crises are infrequent in nature, longer in duration and more severe in their consequences. Like any recovery from a serious illness, a period of gradual improvement, occasionally requiring some additional attention, should be expected.

Using the metrics of common contractions to describe the aftermath of a crisis is likely to lead to a sense of disappointment or a misdiagnosing of real improvement as somehow falling short of the mark. Even worse, a wrong diagnosis could lead to an inappropriate policy response or improper allocation in an investment portfolio.

Since we find ourselves in the aftermath of a financial crisis, additional attention will be required. If history serves as a guide, we need to be prepared for a prolonged period of mediocre growth, higher than normal unemployment and a challenging environment for home prices. Furthermore, both our economy and financial markets remain vulnerable to an outside shock. By the same logic, however, we should acknowledge that the "crisis" is behind us and that while the road ahead is long and not without its challenges, with enough time and the proper medicine it is nonetheless the road to recovery.

to full health will largely be the result of the policy prescribed. Having already lowered interest rates to near nothing, our options are limited. Federal Reserve Chairman Bernanke recently signaled a change in monetary policy by paving the way for an additional form of monetary stimulus alternatively known as quantitative easing, or debt monetization.

The ultimate goal of this policy is to increase economic growth, create jobs and fight deflation in an environment where additional fiscal stimulus is limited. The fact that we have to resort to these measures is bad news in itself. The long-term effects of quantitative easing are not well understood and may have serious consequences, such as promoting additional asset bubbles or higher than desired inflation. The short-term effects are visible in the form of unnaturally low interest rates and a weaker dollar.

The exceptionally low level of interest rates today can have both a positive and negative impact on the economy. Low interest rates help homeowners lower their mortgage payments and allow corporations to lower their cost of capital. Low interest rates also reduce the income available to those living off of fixed investments such as CDs and bonds. Interest rates as low as they are today, however, have an even more dire aspect. They have deprived investors of a reasonable return from a traditionally safe investment. In fact, *real* interest rates (the yield on a bond after deducting expected inflation) for U.S. Treasury securities are negative out to five years. To put it another way, investors wishing for the safety of U.S Treasury Notes as long as five years to maturity can expect to lose purchasing power after taking into account the impact of inflation.

For our policymakers, exceptionally low interest rates are a means to an end — a lower dollar. To be sure, a lower dollar may be the single most important economic variable these policymakers can influence to bring about their desired goals. A lower dollar should help make goods and services produced in the United States more competitive in the global economy, resulting in a faster pace of growth and more jobs. A lower dollar is also an important factor in helping to reduce our current account and trade deficits, a necessary outcome if we are to ever meaningfully improve our over-reliance on debt.

Our trading partners, however, are unlikely to take a decline in the dollar lightly. For decades, many of these countries have built their economies on exports to the United States. As we rein in our spending and make foreign goods more expensive, we present a major threat to the primary engine of growth for these countries. Indeed, we have recently seen efforts by Japan, Brazil, China, Chile, South Korea and Russia to prevent their currencies from appreciating too much against the dollar. It is our belief that the role of currencies is likely to become an increasing factor in the relations between trading partners as well as in the global macroeconomic outlook in general.

Strategy

Over the foreseeable future we expect interest rates to move gradually higher. Currently the portfolio's sensitivity to a change in interest rates is below that of the benchmark. The current low rate environment leaves the bond market without much of a yield cushion to avoid negative rates of returns should interest rates begin to rise more than already anticipated by the market.

Given our outlook and the current level of uncertainty in the markets, we are comfortable keeping the portfolio's exposure to a change in interest rates below that of the benchmark.

As of the end of the quarter, the District's consolidated portfolios consisted of approximately 4.5 percent Corporate Bonds, 73.5 percent Agency Securities, 12.1 percent US Treasury Securities and 9.9 percent Mortgage Backed Securities; see Exhibit 5.

Budget Impact

The portfolio's performance is reported on a total economic return basis. This method includes the coupon interest, amortization of discounts and premiums, capital gains and losses and price changes (i.e., unrealized gains and losses). For the quarter ending September 30, the *General Fund portfolio* returned **0.49** percent. This compares to the benchmark return of **1.76** percent. Over this same time period, the *Paratransit Fund portfolio* returned **0.91** percent. This compares to the benchmark return of **3.29** percent.

The Performance graph in Exhibit 3 shows the relative performance of each fund for the trailing 24-month period (or since inception). The Growth of a Thousand Dollars graph in Exhibit 4 shows the cumulative performance over this same time frame for each portfolio.

The consolidated portfolio's yield to maturity, the return the portfolio will earn in the future <u>if</u> all securities are held to maturity is also reported. This calculation is based on the current market value of the portfolio including unrealized gains and losses. For the quarter ending September 30, the portfolio's yield to maturity was 0.73 percent. The benchmark's yield to maturity was 0.87 percent.

Another method of measuring the consolidated portfolio's yield to maturity is the yield of the portfolio at cost. This calculation is based on the value of the portfolio at cost and does not include any unrealized gains or losses as part of its computation. As of the end of the quarter the consolidated portfolio's rate of return on investments, at cost, was 3.21 percent.

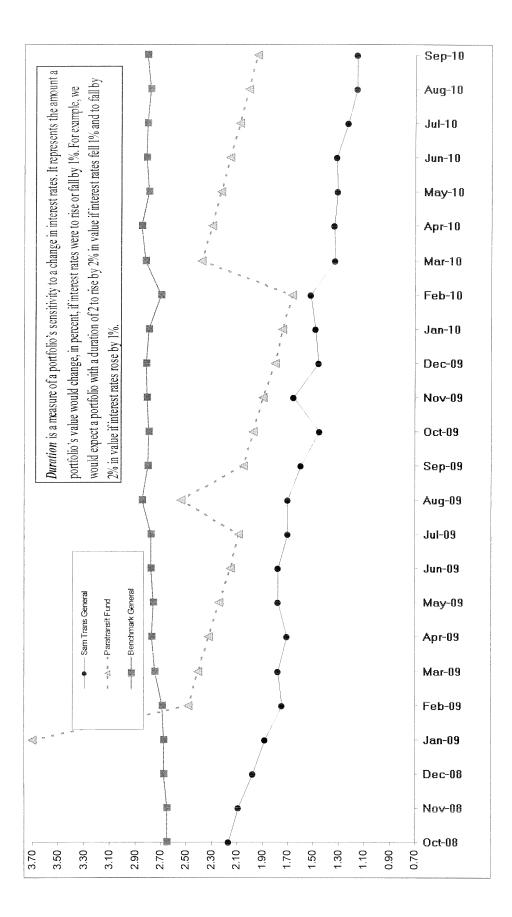

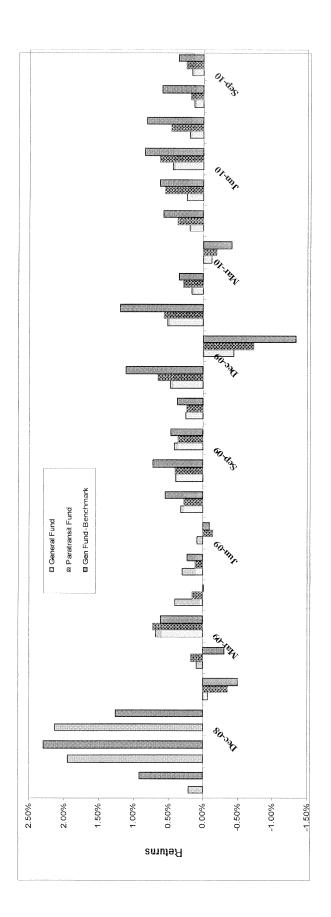

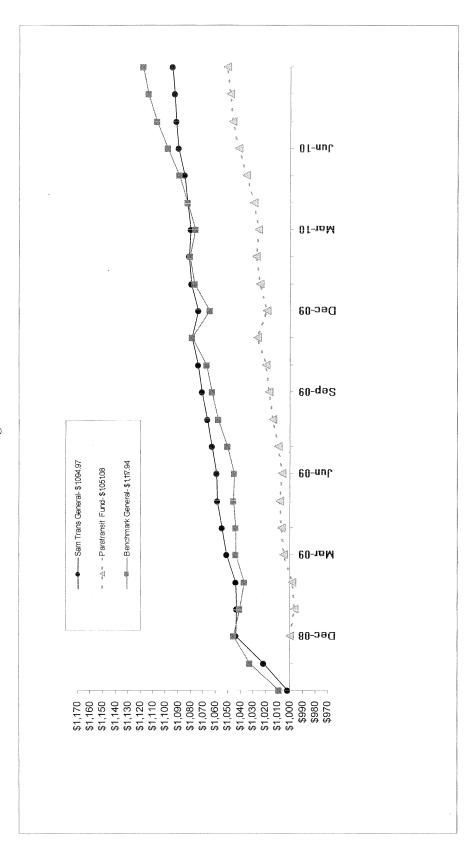
Sam Trans Monthly Review – Account vs. Benchmark Rolling 24 Months

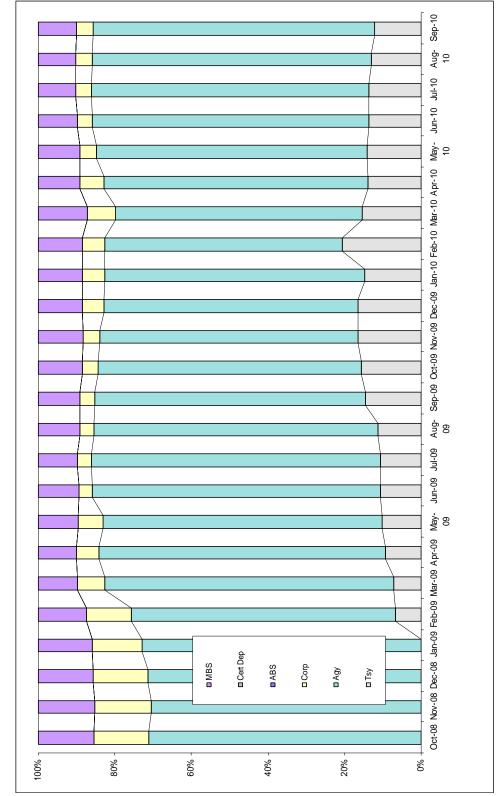

ACTION

CONFLICT OF INTEREST CODE FOR THE

SAN MATEO COUNTY TRANSIT DISTRICT

The Political Reform Act of 1974 (Government Code Sections 81000 et seq.) requires state and local government agencies to adopt and promulgate Conflict of Interest Codes. The Fair Political Practices Commission has adopted a regulation (2 Cal. Code of Regs. Section 18730), which contains the terms of a standard Conflict of Interest Code and can be incorporated by reference in an agency's Code. After public notice and hearing, it may be amended by the Fair Political Practices Commission to conform to amendments in the Political Reform Act.

Therefore, the terms of 2 California Code of Regulations Section 18730 and any amendments duly adopted by the Fair Political Practice Commission are hereby incorporated by reference. This regulation and the attached Appendix, designating officials and employees and establishing disclosure categories, shall constitute the Conflict of Interest Code of the San Mateo County Transit District ("District").

Designated officials and employees shall file statements of economic interests with the District who will make the statement available for public inspection and reproduction. (Gov. Code Section 81008.) The District shall make and retain a copy of the statements and forward the originals to the San Mateo County Board of Supervisors, which shall be the filing officer.

Director Adrienne Tissier called the meeting to order at 2:59 p.m.

Approval of Minutes of Legislative Committee Meeting of September 8, 2010 The committee approved the minutes (Church/Deal).

Authorize Calling on Congress to Pass Long-term Surface Transportation Reauthorization Government Affairs Manager Seamus Murphy said staff is proposing the Committee recommend the Board adopt a resolution calling on Congress to enact long-term surface transportation legislation. The last budget authorization for Federal Surface Transportation spending expired a year ago. Since then, Congress has repeatedly extended the current level spending, which is inadequate to maintain current public transportation needs nationwide. The American Public Transportation Association (APTA) recently delivered thousands of petition signatures calling on Congress to do this exact thing. The administration, for the first time, announced a vision for long-term surface transportation reauthorization, so there are positive signs that Congress will move forward.

Committee Chair Kersteen-Tucker asked if the resolution has been circulated to other cities. Mr. Murphy said staff has met with a number of cities and has forwarded signed resolutions to APTA.

The Committee (Lloyd/Guilbault) unanimously recommended Board acceptance of the motion.

Authorize Support of Measure M to Fund Local Transportation Improvements in San Mateo County

Mr. Murphy said staff is proposing the Committee recommend the Board adopt a resolution supporting Measure M on the November 2 ballot in San Mateo County. The measure was authorized through the passage of SB 83 last year and placed on the ballot by the City/County Association of Governments. If passed, the measure would generate approximately \$6.7 million a year for transportation improvements through a \$10 increase in the vehicle registration fee.



Half of the funds would go towards local streets and road improvements and half of the funds would be available for countywide transportation improvements, including transit operations. This measure requires a majority voter approval.

The Committee (Tissier/Lloyd) unanimously recommended Board acceptance of the motion.

Update on the State Legislative Program

Mr. Murphy reported:

- The Legislature passed the budget and it was signed by the governor, but not before the governor used his line item veto to cut \$1 billion. The only cut to transportation was a reduction in High Speed Rail (HSR) connectivity funding, which was part of Proposition 1A. These funds were cut from \$146 million to \$39 million for local transit agencies and from \$88 million to \$62 million for intercity rail agencies. In both cases the governor stated the remaining funds should be used for positive train control implementation. There is some question whether that restriction is a legal use of his line item veto authority, since technically he can only change the dollar amount, but not enact new policy. Staff is contacting the California Transportation Commission to find out how they intend to move forward with the programming of these funds. Caltrain is eligible for \$41 million in funding through Proposition 1A.
- The governor removed several reporting requirements placed on the California High Speed Rail Authority by the Legislature as conditions for appropriations of the second half of their budget allocation. Those include a new ridership study and reporting back to the Senate Budget Committee before the second round of funding could be awarded.

Update on the Federal Legislative Program

- Congress did not approve its 2011 appropriations bills before the recess so they passed a continuing resolution, which staff expected. This resolution continues funding levels through December 3.
- Staff has been working on several Federal issues and most were areas of focus at APTA's annual meeting. The spare ratio issue is one APTA is asking the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) to revise. The proposed requirements are a result of a Transit Cooperative Research Program study that showed an increase in the spare ratio is warranted in order for fleet management needs to be consistent with service needs. These changes, if implemented, would allow SamTrans to maintain a fleet size of 125 percent of the fleet service requirement rather than the existing 120 percent. Staff is contacting our regional FTA administrator to express our support for the proposed changes.
- Congressman John Garamendi has introduced legislation that would eliminate or change
 many of the waivers and exceptions granted to transit agencies for Buy America
 regulations. APTA is working with the House Transportation and Infrastructure
 Committee to provide specific information on how that proposed legislation would
 impact transit agencies.
- The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act included a provision that increased the monthly amount employers can offer pre-tax benefits to employees who commute by transit. The amount was made equal to the benefit offered to people who commute via automobile. This expires at the end of the year and staff has contacted our delegation and

urged them to extend the benefit at the current levels so parking and transit benefits continue to be on par.

Director Omar Ahmad asked about the cut in transportation. Mr. Murphy said the CTC is in charge of allocating the funding. The governor basically took every project that wasn't a Positive Train Control project and cut it out of the current fiscal year allocation, but he left in \$38 million. The program that staff identified for this cycle is electrification, in the amount of \$4.1 million.

Public Comment

Jerry Grace, San Lorenzo, asked about HSR and cities not wanting to pay for it. Mr. Murphy said in the Environmental Impact Report the route is through the Caltrain corridor and proceeding with the alignment as part of project.

SIGNIFICANCE

Staff will provide regular updates to the Board consistent with the approved Legislative Program.

STATE ISSUES

2010 Election

Staff will provide an overview of the impact of the November 2 elections.

High Speed Rail

On November 4, the California High Speed Rail Authority will consider criteria that will guide the selection of a corridor to receive what is remaining of the State's \$2.25 billion American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) award.

The proposed criteria strongly indicate that ARRA funds will be directed to whichever corridor receives the bulk of Fiscal Year 2011 Federal High Speed and Intercity Passenger Rail Program (HSIPR) funds.

FEDERAL ISSUES

High Speed Rail

On October 28, the Federal Railroad Administration was expected to award \$2.5 billion in grants from the 2010 HSIPR appropriation.

California was to receive \$902 million, with \$715 million awarded to one of the Central Valley corridors. The San Francisco-to-San Jose corridor was to receive \$16 million for the North Terminal project the 4th and King Street station in San Francisco. The project includes

construction of new platforms that will accommodate eventual high-speed rail service and allow Caltrain to continue to serve the station during high-speed rail construction.

Proposed Federal Emissions Rules

The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) recently issued a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking (NPRM) to establish new federal emissions standards for medium and heavy-duty engines including transit buses.

The proposal targets a 10 percent reduction in bus emissions and fuel consumption by 2018. Staff is reviewing the proposal to determine if these new standards could impact the Caltrain shuttle program and whether comments will be necessary.

Proposed Federal Seat Belt Rules

NHTSA also issued a NPRM that would affect motor vehicle safety standards. Specifically, the proposal seeks to establish seat belt requirement for commuter buses such as Greyhound that make longer trips.

The American Public Transportation Association has commented suggesting that the proposal be clarified to ensure that certain bus transit services are not adversely affected. Staff is preparing similar comments.

PUBLIC HEARING TO ADDRESS ADOPTION OF AN UPDATED PROPERTY CONVEYANCE POLICY AND FEE SCHEDULE

District Secretary Martha Martinez said at the September 8, 2010 meeting, the Board of Directors set today's public hearing to consider adoption of an updated Fee Schedule. A public hearing notice appeared in *San Francisco Examiner* on September 19 and 26 and the *San Jose Post-Record* on September 20 and 27. To date, no comments have been received.

Manager, Real Estate and Property Development Brian Fitzpatrick said the San Mateo County Transportation Authority and the Peninsula Corridor Joint Powers Board already have adopted this policy. Mr. Fitzpatrick said the updated fee schedule will capture staff time associated with processing a permit and the land value connected with the facility. He said the updated policy fees are in line with neighboring transit agencies.

Public Comment

Pat Giorni, Burlingame, said when it comes to time for any property that SamTrans owns to be used for High Speed Rail, she hopes the District collects rent.

Director Adrienne Tissier arrived at 2:15 p.m.

Legal Counsel David Miller said all the applicable legal requirements have been met and the Board can close the public hearing.

A motion (Lloyd/Ahmad) to close the hearing was approved unanimously.

Jerry Grace, San Lorenzo, asked if SamTrans helped with the San Bruno fire and were there any bus routes affected.

REPORT OF CHAIR

Chair Guilbault reported:

- The coastside seat held by Director Zoe Kersteen-Tucker expires on December 31, 2010. In 2005, a policy was adopted that specifies Board appointments are to be made in a manner to promote diversity, encompassing location of residency, ethnicity and gender. No public member shall have held elected office one full year prior to being appointed to the board. Directors Karyl Matsumoto, Jerry Deal and Omar Ahmad will serve on the nominating subcommittee that will recommend a nominee.
- Congratulated General Manager/CEO Michael Scanlon on his election as chair of the American Public Transportation Association for the upcoming year.
- The advisory committee of the board met today to discuss the bus advertising policy. More data needs to be considered. The advisory committee will report back to the board at a later date.

REPORT OF THE GENERAL MANAGER/CEO

Mr. Scanlon reported:

- SamTrans sent buses for evacuation and initial shelter as an immediate and direct response to the San Bruno fire. Secondly, Public Information Specialist Tasha Bartholomew assisted staff from San Bruno in fielding calls from the media. Thirdly, staff strongly advocated in favor of an urgency bill to provide relief to San Bruno victims. The bill passed the Legislature last week. Finally, employees donated money that has been passed on to various charities.
- On behalf of staff, expressed deepest sympathy on the passing of CAC member Ken Feldstein.
- Thanked Dr. Michal Settles for her work on the RediCoast service.
- Staff's investment in human capital continues with the start of the next Leadership Academy.
- Transportation specials include the Association for the Advancement of Retired Persons Driver Safety Appreciation programs in San Mateo and San Carlos.
- Bus contracts and procurement staff are working on the Dumbarton Bridge Express Service Request for Proposal.
- Redi-Wheels staff has moved to their new modular at the Brewster facility.
- A major redevelopment of the Mervyns store at the Hillsdale Shopping Center will result in significant changes in bus stop locations.



- The operations planning staff is working with the planning and development staff on the initial work for the Comprehensive Operations Analysis.
- The Executive Team will be given a presentation by staff on the District's Green House Gas Emissions Inventory.
- Maintenance is well above the 19,000 miles goal at 22,000 miles on fixed-route service and 32,000 on Redi-Wheels.
- This weekend Route 17 will not operate on Main Street in Half Moon Bay due to Pumpkin Festival activities.
- Manager of Government Affairs Seamus Murphy and Manager of Community Relations Todd McIntyre were congratulated for being recognized by *Mass Transit Magazine* as one of the 40 up and coming transit industry managers under 40.
- Recognized Mr. McIntyre and Manager of Budgets Eva Goode for being selected for the inaugural class of the ENO Mid-management Training Program.
- Recognized Manager of Strategic Development Corinne Goodrich for being selected to
 participate in the International Transportation Study Program, funded by the Transit
 Cooperation Research Program. Ms. Goodrich will be on a two-week study mission
 entitled "Public Transportation Systems as the Foundation for Economic Growth." She
 will be with 12 other individuals meeting with transit officials in Istanbul, Turkey; Cairo,
 Egypt; Johannesburg and Cape Town, South Africa.
- Thanked Vice Chair Matsumoto, Directors Kersteen-Tucker and Ahmad for attending the APTA Annual Conference.
- Caltrain approved an increase in zone fares and reduction in mid-day service.

Executive Officer Public Affairs Mark Simon said Pico Boulevard is an unimproved road and the only access to South Base in San Carlos. He reported that many bus operators are alarmed at the number of close calls they had with pedestrians, bicyclists and automobiles using Pico Boulevard to access the residential complex. In anticipation of a study, staff decided to close the street to through traffic. Staff conducted a safety and security review of the property and the principal findings concluded the road does not meet the District's safety standards. It is not designed, nor built to be a thorough way or open road. It does not have appropriate signage, roadway markings including bike lanes, and the street lighting is inadequate. A complete traffic engineering study would be necessary to ensure the road could be open to through traffic in a manner that meets District safety standards. Mr. Simon said until such a study is conducted, staff advises against opening the road to pedestrian, bicycle or motor vehicles. Staff has heard from several people who ride their bicycles and use that road to access a bay trail. He said staff is prepared to facilitate scheduling of a meeting between Redwood City, the County of San Mateo and San Carlos to discuss how to improve the safety of Redwood Shores Parkway, a road that is designed to be used for this purpose.

Director Ahmad said the city of San Carlos is undergoing a redesign of the Holly Street/ Highway 101 Interchange. He said if there is an opportunity to work with SamTrans on the San Carlos side he is happy to coordinate a meeting with the public works director.

Director Tissier asked who owns the property that SamTrans leases. Mr. Scanlon said it is leased from a developer. He said staff hears the bike community loud and clear, but the problem is the liability if something happened. Director Tissier said, on behalf of the county, if there is some help needed to facilitate a meeting, please let her know.
