Accessibility Update

Tina Dubost, Manager, Accessible Transit Services, said staff recently sent a letter describing a policy change to all registered paratransit customers to. The revised no-show/ late cancel policy has been changed to be less strict. As before, no-shows or late cancels that occur for reasons beyond the customer's control are not counted.

Paratransit Coordinating Council (PCC) Update

Mike Levinson, Chair, PCC, said the annual appreciation dinner for First Transit employees will be April 11 at 6 p.m. The PCC's regional conference was held on February 21 with approximately 50 attendees.

Citizens Advisory Committee (CAC)

Written report was included in the agenda packet.

Mobility Management Report – Paratransit

David Olmeda, Chief Operating Officer, Bus, said:

- Average weekday ridership (AWR) is over 1,110.
- On-time performance exceeded 90 percent goal.
- Productivity remains above goal. Service volume on RediCoast is one-tenth the size of Redi-Wheels so any variations on trip length or traffic can affect the goal.
- Service complaints are low at .5 complaints for every 2,000 rides.
- Fleet reliability is above 120,000 miles.
- Trip denials remain at zero out of 4.4 million trips.
- Customer destinations include adult day care centers, medical appointments, dialysis centers, community colleges, shopping, work, social activities, personal business and family visits.



- There has been a 13 percent growth in registrants over the last two years.
- Vehicle capacity
 - Cutaways have nine seats and room for two or three mobility devices
 - Mininvans have two seats and one mobility device or one seat with two mobility devices
- New vehicle features include scooter tie downs, new seats with headrest and three point seat belts, and new floor material that allows for easy cleaning.

Director Karyl Matsumoto asked what the most common complaint is. Ms. Dubost said late trips.

Director Dave Pine asked of the 370,000 rides how many involve a mobility device. Mr. Olmeda said 25 percent.

Director Pine asked how taxis feed into the program. Mr. Olmeda said to provide zero denial service trips a taxi service is used.

Chair Rose Guilbault said the new seats look narrower and asked if that will allow for more capacity. Mr. Olmeda said no. Staff had people test the seats and they are the same size currently used.

Director Carole Groom said she is pleased to see the new tie downs. Mr. Olmeda said the securements were modified to be able to secure mobility devices to the floor.

Quarterly Dashboard – October-December 2016

Mr. Olmeda said the dashboard has been updated from the February meeting and provides information for the last quarter.

Director Matsumoto asked what the reasons are for "Did Not Operate." Mr. Olmeda said they are related to staffing levels or delays in construction.

Director Josh Powell asked what the difference is from last month's and this one. Mr. Olmeda said last month was the first quarter of the fiscal year and this is the second quarter and the Did Not Operate category was added.

Director Powell asked if the previous quarter can be added with the current one for a comparison. Jim Hartnett, General Manager/CEO, said it would be better to have the previous report included each quarter. The purpose of the dashboard is to be static and easy to look at it. Mr. Hartnett said the dashboard will be posted on the website.

Mr. Olmeda said the dashboard is for frontline employees to see if goals are being met.



Multimodal Ridership Report – January 2017

Mr. Olmeda reported:

- Compared to January 2016
 - AWR was down for all modes, but it was very wet weather. When Bay Area Rapid Transit stations that are served by SamTrans have decreases in ridership SamTrans sees a decrease in ridership.
 - Bus ridership was 35,720, a decrease of 10.8 percent.
 - Paratransit ridership was 1,120, a decrease of 5.1 percent.
 - Caltrain ridership was 55,270, a decrease of 1.3 percent.
 - Shuttle ridership was 11,840, a decrease of 6.2 percent.
 - Total weekday ridership was 148,500, a decrease of 5.9 percent.
 - o Total Monthly Ridership
 - Bus ridership was 901,990, a decrease of 9.6 percent.
 - Paratransit ridership was 28,470, an increase of 2.7 percent.
 - Caltrain ridership was 1,477,360, an increase of 0.1 percent.
 - Shuttle ridership was 252,930, a decrease of 3.5 percent.
 - Total weekday ridership was 3,782,430, a decrease of 4 percent.

Director Matsumoto said there is a drop in youth fares. She said the South San Francisco shuttle is free and asked if this accounts for the decrease in fares.

Director Stone said winter break went much later into the month of January this year and may be the reason for the drop in youth fares.

Director Jeff Gee said the same drop in ridership in shuttles is seen at Commute.org. He said Gilead employees used to take the shuttles, but now have their own shuttle buses.

Mr. Hartnett said at the recent American Public Transportation Association Chief Executive Officers Conference the issue of the drop in ridership came up and bus providers across the country are reporting declines. Some are thinking the change in law that undocumented people can now get driver's licenses may have some effect on this.

MEETING MINUTES February 14, 2017

WELCOME/INTRODUCTION

Mike called the meeting to order at 1:30 p.m. and welcomed all to the February PCC meeting.

APPROVAL OF THE JANUARY PCC MINUTES

Dinae motioned to approve the January PCC meeting minutes and Barbara seconded the motion. None of the PCC members abstained from voting and no corrections were noted.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

A. POLICY ADVOCACY- LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE (PAL)

Mike reported that the PAL Committee met today, prior to the PCC. Emergency assistance planning and vehicle configuration for wheelchairs were discussed. FAA Guidance on Aviation Tax revenues is expected to be clarified by the end of 2017.

Richard reported on non-ADA transportation services provided by TNCs. Whistlestop, in Marin County, has piloted two programs to utilize Lyft for transportation of Institute on Aging clients. He made clear that neither this nor the other program, in which Lyft fills in the gaps when volunteer drivers are unavailable, are meant to fill in for ADA paratransit programs. Differences in services between Lyft and ADA paratransit were identified, such as the lack of door to door service and assistance with packages. Dave and John commented on private shuttle services used by non-profits (like PACE) for the transport of their clients to day programs. Barbara said that PACE is like adult day health care programs, in that those clients are likely to be ADA paratransit eligible, in which private transportation lessens the demand on ADA paratransit.

B. GRANT/BUDGET REVIEW

Barbara reported that the Get Up and Go Program in Foster City has applied for 5310 Program funding, but the grant application is not for a vehicle. Jim Lange said that the funds the Pacifica Senior Center was awarded two years ago are expected to be available for a vehicle purchase this year.

C. EDUCATION COMMITTEE

Sammi reported that the last conference call was on February 3, 2017. Presentations are planned for April 5 and May 19, along with two additional outreach events that have not had dates confirmed.

The next Education Committee meeting will be a conference call that is scheduled for April 7, 2017 from 1:00 to 1:45 p.m.

D. EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Mike reported that the Executive Committee did not meet recently, but some members of the Executive Committee have been working to finalize planning for the 2017 PCC Regional Conference. An agenda for the event has been sent out, with hard copies also being made available on the day of the event. Five breakout groups have been planned and facilitators are being assigned to work with each group.

SAMTRANS/REDI-WHEELS REPORT

A. Operational Report

Margo Ross from SamTrans attended today's meeting to report on the IVR system update. Testing of Imminent Arrival calls will begin soon. At the present time, 70% of the IVR calls are successful and 30% are not complete or inaccurate. SamTrans spoke to Enghouse and discussed potential repairs to the system to improve call accuracy. Work is also being done to select a newer program that would provide 85-90% accuracy. Barbara asked about the 30% failure rate for the current IVR system. Tina said that the calls would be incomplete due to specific types of situations, such as a vehicle already having arrived at a location and picked up the customer, or arriving very late to a location. Other calls were inaccurate because the ETA (Estimated Time of Arrival) did not match for different reasons. Tina added that SamTrans has also been working with Trapeze to troubleshoot the accuracy issue. The PCC members discussed other known Bay Area counties who utilize an IVR system that notifies customers when the vehicle is near the pickup point. Margo confirmed for Mike that any new system will be put out to bid in the RFP process. Any new program will not be reviewed for a few more months.

Talib reported that he has a system in place for the taxis to call the customers directly when their ride is near the pick-up point without the taxi driver knowing the customer's phone number.

B. Performance Measures Report

Tina reported that total ridership in December 2016 was very similar to December 2015. Average Daily Ridership has continued to increase. The number of individual riders in a given month is also increasing. Transfer trips are down. Productivity, Telephone Hold Times, and On-time performance all met the standard. Taxis as the percentage of total trips continues to fluctuate. Richard asked Tina about the decrease in productivity over

the past few months. Dave commented that there are some complex factors at play when calculating productivity. Richard also asked about the drop in Inter-County Transfer trips. Tina said that a limited of number customers used to make a high number of Transfer trips, but they are traveling long distances less often now.

C. Monthly Redi-Wheels Comment Statistics Report

John gave the 2016 Roll-Up Report for Redi-Wheels Comment Statistics. Overall, the trends for comments have not changed. Late Vehicles and Driver Conduct comments continue to be the most common type of customer comment. Response Time to Customers improved over the year in 2016. Redi-Wheels Comment Cards with pre-paid postage are now stocked on vehicles. Most Redi-Wheel Comment Cards are compliments, rather than complaints. Margo commented further on the low number of customer complaints. She congratulated SamTrans and First Transit staff for providing such good customer service.

Safety Report

Dave reported that there were zero preventable taxi accidents and one preventable Redi-Wheels accident. After safety training, Dave followed up further with the driver who was involved in the accident. Jim, Tina, and Dave discussed the differences in the use of Q'Straint securements for wheelchairs and scooters.

LIAISON REPORTS

A. COASTSIDE TRANSPORTATION COMMITTEE (CTC)

A Coastside representative was not available today. Mike reported that Michal Settles stepped down from the PCC last month and will be replaced by Cara Schmaljohn from Senior Coastsiders.

B. AGENCY

Barbara said that no updates are available today.

C. EFFICIENCY REVIEW COMMITTEE (ERC)

The next ERC meeting date has not been set. Mike and Dinae asked Tina if she could set a date for an ERC meeting to continue working on the IVR issue.

D. COMMISSION ON AGING (COA)

Sandra reported that the COA met recently and had a presentation given by Tippy Irwin from the Ombudsmen Service of San Mateo County.

E. COMMISSION ON DISABILITIES (COD)

Vincent absent, no reports available.

F. CENTER FOR THE INDEPENDENCE OF INDIVIDUALS WITH DISABILITIES (CID)

Mike reported that Vincent will be stepping down from CiD, COD, and the PCC.

G. DEPARTMENT OF REHABILITATION (DOR)

Ka'ili reported that there are no new updates to report today.

OTHER BUSINESS

Monica reported that she received a copy of the most current No-Show/Late Cancel policy updates from Redi-Wheels.

Mike announced that the 2017 PCC Regional Conference is planned to take place on Tuesday, February 21 from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m.

The next PAL and PCC meetings will be held on Tuesday, March 14, 2017. The PAL Committee will meet from 11:30 a.m.-12:30 p.m. and the PCC will meet from 1:30-3:30 p.m.

The First Transit Appreciation Party is scheduled from Tuesday, April 11. More details will be sent out after the 2017 PCC Regional Conference.

Tina gave an update on airport revenue and fuel sales tax programs under FAA.

Richard discussed a webinar that is taking place today about mobility management and transportation network companies (TNCs). He volunteered to give a short talk at today's PCC meeting about pilot programs that are being conducted by Whistlestop Wheels in the use of transportation network companies (like Lyft and Uber) in the provision of non-ADA transportation to people with disabilities and seniors.

LOCAL ADVOCACY ISSUES—OPEN DISCUSSION

Richard and Sandra discussed senior walking groups who provide reports on sidewalk safety issues in the Bay Area.

POLICY ISSUES

Sammi and Dinae reported that they received their updated No-Show / Late Cancel Policy update from Redi-Wheels.

Tina gave an update on the Bus Review Committee. Tina said that replacement vehicles are expected to arrive by the end of the calendar year. John reported on some aspects of the process involved in selecting bus driver seats for the SamTrans and

Redi-Wheels drivers. Dave shared some information from a Q'Straint training event that he attended recently. Sammi asked about training for customers to help them to understand what to do in the event of a serious accident on a vehicle. Dave described how First Transit and Redi-Wheels staff are trained to respond to accidents and how the Fire Department is called to the scene to respond. John discussed emergency preparedness information that is included in SamTrans and Redi-Wheels publications for customers.

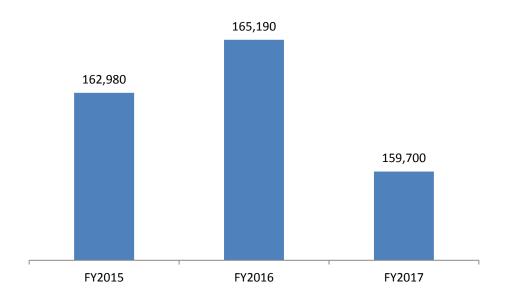

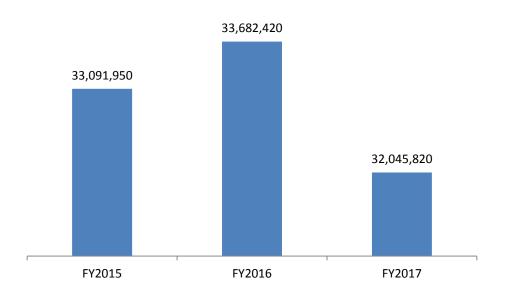

To help promote these fun destinations, SamTrans launched a newly designed site to be used as a guide to feature all the attractions in one location on the SamTrans website. Go.samtrans.com is the one stop shop of events happening in the service area that are accessible by bus or train. From parades, street fairs and farmers' markets, the site connect customers to the fun. To carry the new design throughout, the Transit Fun Guide was also redesigned along with the website to display more eye appeal with bigger photos and easy to read navigation about connecting bus routes and information. Being a soft launch of the site, communications to promote the site included Peninsula Moves blog post, newly designed web button on homepage, take-ones onboard buses and organic social media push. A heavier promotional push will be developed once minor bugs are flushed out and more content/events come online.

Partnerships – SamTrans collaborated with the Bay Area Travel & Adventure Show held at the Santa Clara Convention Center from February 11 and 12. As part of the partnership, the co-promoted event was listed on the GoSamTrans take-one and placed onboard the train and at select stations, displayed on the gosamtrans.com website, Peninsula Moves Blog, organic social media posts promoting the event. As part of the partnership, the event also posted ad cards onboard buses and trains, logos posted on travel show's website and offered Caltrain/SamTrans customers a \$2 discount if they took transit to the event.

SamTrans Social Media Promotions and Analytics – SamTrans social media saw meager growth in February, although we did cross the 7,000 followers mark. We held several contests with sweaters as prizes. In addition, we held a high-level partnership contest with Cinequest. Kathleen Kelly, Interim Chief Financial Officer, said total sources of funds are on target. Fare revenue is down about \$1.5 million, but other items are up, which makes up the difference. There is a surplus in expenses with \$1.5 million in fuel savings.

Director Jeff Gee said the half-cent sales tax comes in so late and it is difficult to see as it doesn't true-up.

Mr. Skinner said this project will be between the Palo Alto Caltrain Station and Daly City Bay Area Rapid Transit (BART) Station. Once complete this project will improve transit speed along El Camino Real by either giving buses green lights or extending green lights at intersections. Staff will be working with the California State Department of Transportation (Caltrans), City/County Association of Governments (C/CAG), and cities along the corridor to ensure the project is implemented.

Director Jeff Gee asked how long this will take to implement. Mr. Skinner said before 2021.

Director Charles Stone asked what the implementation of the project will do to traffic on the arterials that intersect with El Camino Real. Mr. Skinner said part of the work that will be done by the cities, C/CAG and Caltrans to determine impacts on cross traffic.

Director Dave Pine said C/CAG made a tremendous investment in the corridor and asked how this project interrelates. Mr. Skinner said staff will work with technology that C/CAG has installed and piggyback to implement the traffic signal priority. The technology being installed will be very similar to what the Santa Clara Valley Transportation Authority installed between Santa Clara and the Palo Alto Caltrain Station.

Director Zoe Kersteen-Tucker asked how long this take will and how much disruption will occur in traffic along El Camino Real. Mr. Skinner said he doesn't know. The actual installation shouldn't disrupt as the software is installed at control boxes.

Update on the San Carlos Transit Center and Transit Village Projects

Brian Fitzpatrick, Manager, Real Estate and Property Development, reported:

- San Carlos Transit Village (SCTV)
 - o Transit-Oriented Development Project
 - Project north of Holly Street
 - o Partnership with Prometheus, Legacy and the District
 - Long-term land lease where developer owns building, but the District owns the land
 - o 200 residential units and 25,000 square feet of commercial space
 - Six-acre site
 - Creates revenue stream to District
- Originally the developer would construct transit center for the District at District cost. Staff was able to obtain a \$4.9 million Federal grant
- SCTV commenced construction to begin on northern most site once the San Carlos Transit Center new parking lots are developed



Director Stone said this is much needed housing and there are parking lots in Belmont and maybe creative thinking can happen for this location.

Director Kersteen-Tucker asked when the Transit Village will be completed. Mr. Fitzpatrick said end of 2018.

Director Kersteen-Tucker asked how much revenue will be generated. Mr. Fitzpatrick said \$750,000 a year, but after year five the District participates in the success of the project at a 10 percent rate and after year 20 of the lease the District will participate in the gross revenue of the property at 10.5 percent. Every time the property is sold or refinanced the District gets 1 percent and then subsequently 2 percent.

Director Gee asked how Prometheus got involved. Mr. Fitzpatrick said Promotheus bought the majority of the project from Legacy.

Director Kersteen-Tucker asked when money starts flowing in. Mr. Fitzpatrick said the District receives construction rent and prestabilization rent. When the building is opened and at 90 percent occupancy SamTrans collects full rent as based on the lease.

Chair Rose Guilbault asked if this are low-income housing. Mr. Fitzpatrick said 15 percent will be affordable and the remaining will be market based.

Director Josh Powell asked if there are any other projects in the pipeline. Mr. Fitzpatrick said there is one at Hayward Park Caltrain Station which is a Peninsula Corridor Joint Powers Board (JPB) property and the other is at the Daly City Park and Ride Lot at the Colma BART Station.

Jim Hartnett, General Manager/CEO, said the upcoming budget process will provide the Board with options. He said staff has heard the Board on what is important.

Director Stone said this is information the Board needs to digest and to help make decisions. He feels staff has heard the Board from the last two retreats on how to reinvent the agency for the 21st Century.

Chair Guilbault said she is excited to hear about this plan and it is evident staff has heard the Board. She would like the Board to work with staff on how to best utilize the



Board retreat and this information and getting the Board involved in some of the actions and getting prepared for the 2018 ballot.

Director Kersteen-Tucker asked how the financial projections are being thought about based on the new Administration. Mark Simon, Chief of Staff, said staff doesn't know if programs will be continued under the Administration.

Director Kersteen-Tucker likes the idea of multi-modal being in the District's DNA. She asked if any thought has been given to the idea of including staff members from the technology community to partner in the Office of Innovation.

Mr. Kim said, based on Board direction, staff is looking at how to get Coastside service right and will be having a couple of workshops on the Coast to ask the public what can be done to improve service.

Rejection of All Bids to Furnish and Deliver New 8D Bus Batteries

Public Comment

Shao Dyl, City Auto Supply, said his company is a wholesale distributor of auto parts. He said his company has been servicing the District for 15 years. In the letter he received from staff regarding the rejection of bids the main reason was that the initial vendor outreach efforts didn't reach all eligible local vendors and the conclusion by staff was to reject all bids and reissue the Invitation for Bids (IFB). Mr. Dyl said there were five responsible, responsive bidders and City Auto Supply was \$166,476 below the highest bid and \$43,000 below the lowest bid. He said their company found the bid like everyone else on the website and took the time to complete the IFB and submit by the deadline. Mr. Dyl said their company's concern is they were the lowest bid and they did their due diligence.

Committee Chair Groom said staff discovered another local vendor didn't receive the package and that is the reason for rejection.

Joan Cassman, Legal Counsel, said staff weighed the pros and cons of this rejection. She said there is a smaller, local vendor that wasn't aware this contract had been put out for a competitive bid.

Mr. Dyl said now the public knows their pricing and it could be a disadvantage for the other bidders.

Director Stone asked if there is a need to take action today on this issue to protect the District from litigation. Ms. Cassman said this is a discretionary matter.

Nita Vigil, Acting Director, Contracts and Procurement, said staff wants to make sure as many vendors as possible bid and wanted to allow local inclusion. She said staff is ready to reissue the IFB tomorrow.

Director Stone asked what the Board's options are. Ms. Cassman said this award could be put over a month, award the contract, or reject the bid. The low bid is responsive.

Director Gee said this has been publicly advertised procurement and five responsive proposals were received and he would like this brought to the April meeting with the bid results from the five bidders for the Board's review.

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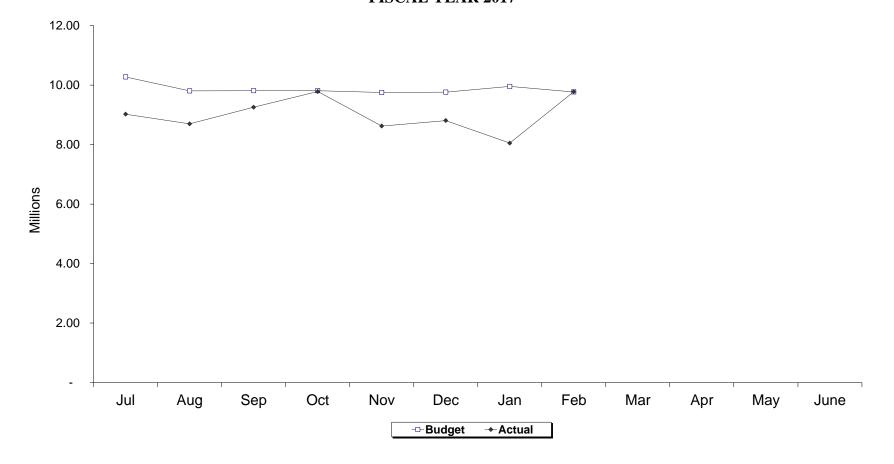

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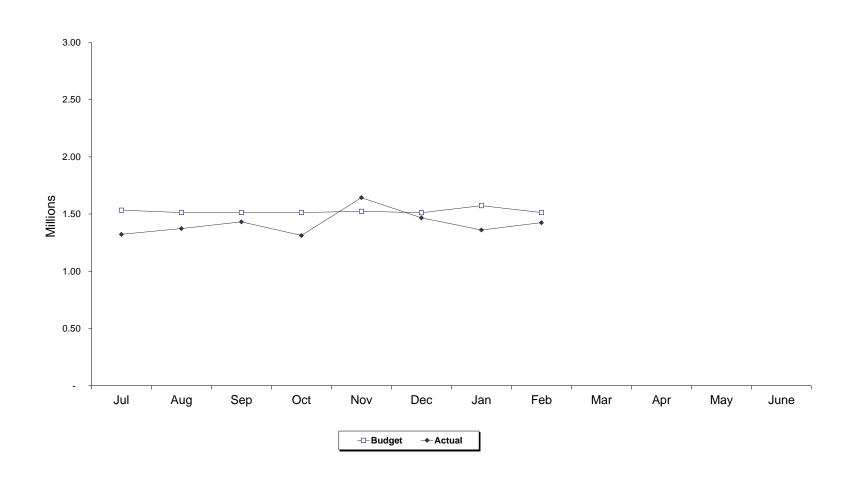
MOTOR BUS MONTHLY EXPENSES - BUDGET VS ACTUAL FISCAL YEAR 2017

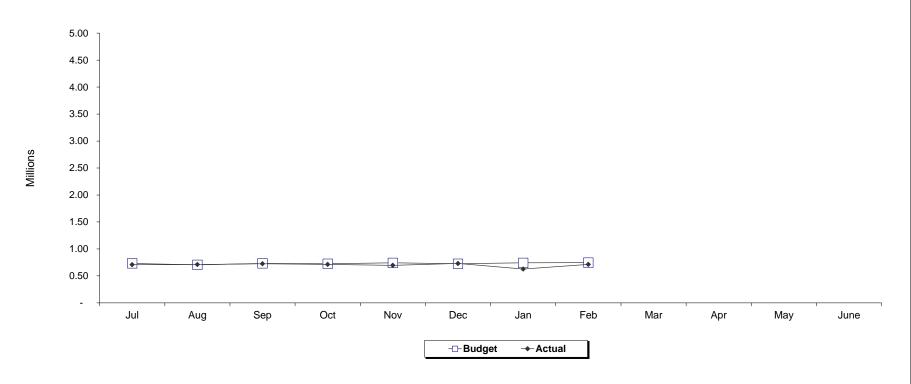
ADA PROGRAM MONTHLY EXPENSES - BUDGET VS ACTUAL FISCAL YEAR 2017

SECURITY GRANT PROGRAM FUNDS

ACTION

Staff proposes the Committee recommend the Board authorize the General Manager/CEO, or his designee, to:

- Submit grant applications, with concurrent Letter of No Prejudice (LONP) requests, to the California Governor's Office of Emergency Services (Cal OES); and
- 2. File and execute certifications, assurances and other documentation as required to receive \$885,124 in Fiscal Year (FY) 2017 Proposition 1B California Transit Security Grant Program (CTSGP) funds from the State for transportation security projects.

SIGNIFICANCE

Cal OES requires eligible recipients of Proposition 1B CTSGP funds to submit resolutions approved by their governing bodies that authorize the designated agency officer(s) to execute any action necessary for the processing of applications associated with the programming and receipt of funds. Approval of this item will meet Cal OES's CTSGP funding requirement

In the event the State Controller is unable to sell a sufficient amount of bonds to fund all Proposition 1B capital projects around the State, including San Mateo County Transit District (District) projects, the District will request a LONP to enable work to proceed, using District funds, which would then be reimbursed by the State once bond proceeds become available.

BUDGET IMPACT

There is no budget impact related to this action. These funds are included in the FY2017 Capital Budget for the Dumbarton Corridor Fencing Project.

BACKGROUND

The Highway Safety, Traffic Reduction, Air Quality and Port Security Bond Act of 2006, otherwise known as Proposition 1B, was approved by California voters on November 7, 2006. Proposition 1B includes a funding program specifically for transit safety and security projects, known as the CTSGP. The State Controller develops a list of eligible transit operators and the amount of funds that each operator is eligible to receive on an annual basis. Funding allocations are contingent on bond sales and it has historically taken over one year to receive funds once an allocation request has been submitted to the State.

Board authorization for the filing of applications by the agency's appointed agent is a Cal OES requirement. To allow greater flexibility, Cal OES does not require applicants to list each project in their governing body resolutions. The District's certified resolution will be filed with Cal OES after adoption by the Board. Cal OES informed all transit agencies this is the last year of funding as the Proposition 1B program is coming to an end.

WHEREAS, the California Transit Security Grant Program (CTSGP) is a program for capital security and safety projects that is part of the Highway Safety, Traffic Reduction, Air Quality, and Port Security Bond Act of 2006, otherwise known as Proposition 1B, which was approved by California voters on November 7, 2006; and

WHEREAS, the CTSGP is administered by the California Governor's Office of Emergency Services (Cal OES); and

WHEREAS, the State Controller develops an annual list with the amounts that each eligible project sponsor is programmed to receive; and

WHEREAS, Cal OES requires all eligible recipients of CTSGP funds to submit resolutions approved by their governing bodies that authorize appointed agents to take any actions necessary for the processing of applications; and

WHEREAS, due to a lack of available bond funding for new projects, the State Controller's Office may be unable to allocate CTSGP funds in a timely manner; and

WHEREAS, Assembly Bill 672, signed by the governor on October 11, 2009, authorizes approval of a Letter of No Prejudice (LONP), which allows an eligible applicant to expend its own funds to proceed with work on CTSGP-eligible projects and be reimbursed by the State once CTSGP funds are available; and

WHEREAS, the San Mateo County Transit District (District) is on a list of eligible applicants for CTSGP funds; and

WHEREAS, staff recommends the Board authorize the General Manager/CEO, or his designee, to submit applications for Fiscal Year (FY) 2017 CTSGP funds, with concurrent LONP requests, and to file and execute certifications and assurances and any other documentation required by Cal OES.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Directors of the San Mateo County Transit District, hereby:

ACTION

Staff proposes that the Committee recommends the Board authorize the General Manager, or his designee, to:

- 1. File and execute applications on behalf of the San Mateo County Transit District (District) with the California State Department of Transportation (Caltrans) to aid in the financing of a project, described below, with Federal Transit Administration (FTA) Section 5310 funds; and
- Execute and file all certification of assurances, contracts or agreements, or any other document required by Caltrans; and
- 3. Provide additional information as Caltrans may require in connection with the application for the Section 5310 project; and
- 4. Submit and approve requests for reimbursement of funds from Caltrans for the Section 5310 project; and
- 5. Take such further actions as may be necessary to give effect to the resolution.

SIGNIFICANCE

Staff has submitted a FTA Section 5310 grant application for \$315,000 to develop a taxi voucher/subsidy program to provide same-day trips for people over 65 years of age and people with disabilities. This is a pilot program that would operate in Redwood City, San Carlos, and North Fair Oaks (unincorporated San Mateo County). This service would be an additional component of the District's mobility management services. Eligible customers would pay a flat rate of \$6 per trip with the District subsidizing the remaining cost. The pilot program would operate for three years with start-up activities beginning in July 2018.

BUDGET IMPACT

If successful in securing Federal Section 5310 funds, staff will include funds for this project in the upcoming operating budget.

BACKGROUND

The Section 5310 Program aims to improve mobility for seniors and individuals with disabilities by removing barriers to transportation service and expanding transportation mobility options. Eligible projects include both "traditional" capital investments and "nontraditional" investments that provide services beyond the Americans with Disabilities Act requirements for complementary paratransit services. The FTA allocates Section 5310 funds to the States, so the District would be a sub-recipient to Caltrans. The governor of California has designated the Metropolitan Transportation Commission to select projects in the San Francisco/San Jose urbanized area. The project selection process is expected to be complete by late spring 2017; access to funds is not expected until at least late Fall.

BATTERIES

ACTION

Staff proposes the Committee recommend that the Board:

- Award a contract to the lowest, responsive and responsible bidder, Parts Warehouse Distributors, dba City Auto Supply (City Auto Supply), in the total estimated amount of \$218,965 for a five-year term.
- 2. Authorize the General Manager/CEO to execute a contract in full conformity with the terms and conditions of the solicitation documents.

SIGNIFICANCE

This action is being brought back to the Board of Directors (Board) at its direction from the March 1, 2017 Board meeting following testimony and discussion that raised questions requiring further analysis and consideration. Approval of the above actions will provide the San Mateo County Transit District (District) with a qualified and experienced contractor to furnish and deliver new 8D bus batteries for the heavy-duty buses located at North Base and South Base.

BUDGET IMPACT

Funds to support the award of this contract are included in the adopted Fiscal Year 2017 Operating Budget and will be included in future operating budgets.

BACKGROUND

The solicitation was advertised in a newspaper of general circulation and on the procurement website, Public Purchase, for interested bidders. Standard language setting forth the District's policy regarding Disadvantaged Business Enterprises (DBEs) was included in the solicitation documents.

Five bids were received, (none from DBEs), as listed below:

City Auto Supply provided the lowest bid and, with the exception of a minor irregularity that legal counsel determined could be waived, it met all bid requirements. References indicate that City Auto Supply is a competent and recommended firm. As a result, City Auto Supply was determined to be the lowest, responsive and responsible bidder.

As part of the District's outreach with regard to this contract opportunity, staff individually contacted 10 battery vendors. Individual outreach to a vendor list is a standard practice in which the District engages to maximize competition. Of those 10 vendors notified by staff, only three vendors submitted bids. Of the five bidders listed above, two, including the lowest responsive and responsible bidder, learned of the solicitation through the District's standard advertising efforts and not through an individualized notification from staff.

The District has been purchasing these batteries on the open market, as needed, at a current price of \$185.50 per battery. Prior to the March 1 Board meeting, staff learned that the vendor from which the District has been purchasing 8D bus batteries for the past 18 years was not individually notified of the solicitation and did not learn of it through the District's standard advertising efforts. Although the current vendor was not personally notified of the solicitation, it did have the same opportunity as any other business to learn of this solicitation through the District's advertising efforts, as the low bidder did.

The vendor did not submit a bid for this work and submitted a letter to the District complaining about the procurement process. Although legal counsel determined that the vendor does not have a legal basis to lodge a protest challenging the award of contract, staff concluded that the District's best interest would be served by rejecting all bids and reissuing the solicitation to allow for the potential of more competition and participation by the existing vendor.

At the March 1 Board meeting, the Board decided to continue this item to the subsequent Board meeting in order obtain a fuller understanding of the bidding circumstances and to give consideration to awarding the contract to the lowest bidder, City Auto Supply, which followed all bidding requirements, provided a very competitive bid to the District, and came to the March Board meeting to question the basis for the staff recommendation to reject all bids. City Auto Supply will provide the batteries at a cost of \$124.98 per battery for a savings of \$60.52 per battery over the

prices the District is currently paying. The District estimates that it will purchase 1,600 batteries over the five year term of the contract for a total estimated savings of \$96,832.

Following the Board discussion, public comment provided at the March 1 Board meeting, and further consideration of the procurement record, staff has revised its recommendation and proposes that the Board award to City Auto Supply, the lowest responsible and responsive bidder.

The Board has the discretion to reject all bids, which is allowed pursuant to the terms of the procurement documents. Should the Board elect to reject all bids and reissue this solicitation, there is no guarantee that the District will receive lower bids or more competition. In doing so, the District will forgo the benefit of the current solicitation without certainty as to the outcome of a future solicitation.

AMENDMENT TO THE CONTRACT WITH UNIVERSAL BUILDING SERVICES FOR

THE PROVISION OF BUS STOP CLEANING SERVICES

ACTION

Staff proposes the Committee recommend that the Board:

- 1. Increase the amount of the contract with Universal Building Services for the provision of bus stop cleaning services (Contract) by \$163,365;
- 2. Authorize an amendment to the Contract to expand the services to include one additional transit-hub bus stop, and to extend the contract on a month-to-month basis through December 31, 2017;
- 3. Authorize the General Manager/CEO, or his designee, to execute a contract amendment reflecting the above actions.

SIGNIFICANCE

Approval of the above actions will provide the San Mateo County Transit District (District) with a qualified contractor to provide continuous routine and emergency cleaning services to District-owned bus shelters, benches, and trash receptacles. This amendment will bridge a gap in service until a single solicitation can be executed for both Bus Stop Cleaning and Janitorial Services at the District's facilities. The amendment will also provide additional cleaning services for the transit-hub bus stop located near Sequoia Station.

BUDGET IMPACT

Funding for this project is included in the Fiscal Year (FY) 2017 and FY2018 operating budgets.

BACKGROUND

On February 10, 2010, pursuant to Resolution No. 2010-13, the Board authorized the General Manager/CEO or his designee to enter into a contract with Universal Building Services for Bus Stop Cleaning Services for a three-year base term for an estimated price of \$938,694 with up to two additional one-year option terms. The District has exercised both option years and further extended the contract through March 31, 2017 on a month-to-month basis.

Universal Building Services currently provides continuous routine and emergency cleaning services to 273 District-owned bus shelters, benches, and trash receptacles. Under this amendment, Universal Building Services will provide routine and emergency cleaning services at 274 bus stop locations on a month-to-month basis through December 31, 2017 at a cost not-to-exceed \$163,365 to allow for a single solicitation for both Bus Stop Cleaning and Janitorial Services at the District's facilities. This amendment will increase the total contract value to \$1,102,059.

The District's other 125 bus stop locations have ad/media shelters that are furnished and maintained by another vendor under a separate contract.

ACTION

Staff proposes the Committee recommend the Board:

- Award a contract through the State of California Department of General Services' (DGS) California Multiple Awards Schedule (CMAS) to Gonneville, Inc. of San Clemente, California for the purchase and delivery of new light-emitting diode (LED) lighting at a total cost of \$334,313, inclusive of delivery and taxes; and
- 2. Authorize the General Manager/CEO to execute a contract with Gonneville, Inc. in accordance with the terms and conditions of the DGS/CMAS contract and in a form approved by legal counsel.

SIGNIFICANCE

Approval of the above actions will provide the San Mateo County Transit District (District) with energy-efficient LED lights for replacement of existing high-intensity discharge (HID) lights at North Base and South Base, purchased through State competitively bid contracts. The LEDs are approximately 80 percent more energy-efficient and have a lifetime twice as long as the existing lighting at the bases. As a result, through this purchase the District would realize significant annual operational and maintenance cost savings, as well as a reduced carbon footprint due to energy conservation. With an annual electricity cost savings of approximately \$110,000, the simple payback is expected to be three years, not including installation cost, maintenance savings, or anticipated rebates from Pacific Gas & Electric (PG&E) energy-efficiency programs. Installation services will be procured under a separate contract.

BUDGET IMPACT

The funds for this project are included in the current year capital budget.

BACKGROUND

The District participates in a cooperative effort to convert existing HID and fluorescent lighting to LED lighting systems. This is a joint effort initiated in 2011 by the District along with the California Public Utilities Commission, the City/County Association of Governments of San Mateo County and PG&E. The cooperative plan was developed under State/PG&E guidelines to meet the stated requirements for an existing utility incentive rebate program. Currently, rebates for this project are expected to be \$69,500.

Within the lighting industry, LED lighting systems have evolved at a fast pace; there are frequent changes to the manufacturers and their product lines. The State/PG&E rebate program is linked to existing qualified materials listed on the DGS/CMAS contracts in effect at the time of order placement. The District's lighting requirements as reviewed by the cooperative agencies are from two manufacturers and their respective units are available from only one distributor, Gonneville, Inc., currently listed in the DGS/CMAS contracts.

The District uses DGS/CMAS contracts for the purchase of equipment, commodities and vehicles. The California Public Contract Code allows the District to purchase vehicles, equipment, and other commodities through the State of California's competitively bid contracts. With access to the DGS list of suppliers, the District benefits by purchasing, at highly competitive prices, items of proven design and manufacturing standards that meet District specifications. Staff obtained a Buy America Certificate to assure that all the LEDs being purchased meet the Federal Transit Administration's Buy America requirements.

ACTION

Staff proposes that the Committee recommend that the Board:

- 1. Reject the single bid received from G&K Services, Inc., of Hayward, California for the provision of rental, purchase and laundering of work clothing, shop towels and related items, which staff and legal counsel determined to be non-responsive; and
- 2. Authorize the General Manager/CEO or his designee to negotiate terms, conditions, and service rates for a contract with a five year term with one or more qualified firms for these services, following staff's solicitation of firms on the open market.

SIGNIFICANCE

Approval of the above action will allow for rejection of the single bid received and will provide staff with the requisite authority to research the marketplace to identify contractors with which to negotiate fair and reasonable prices for the required services.

The subject solicitation, as well as the prior solicitation for these services, resulted in a single non-responsive bid for each solicitation. The San Mateo County Transit District (District) has historically experienced difficulties obtaining fully-responsive bids from this service industry, and a re-solicitation is unlikely to yield different results, staff requests authorization to negotiate appropriate contractual arrangements in the open market with qualified suppliers of these services.

Neither State law nor the District's Procurement Policy and procedures prevent the District from rejecting the sole bid, soliciting qualified firms on the open market and entering into negotiations with one or more qualified firms. Any recommendation for a contract award resulting from those negotiations will be presented to the Board at a subsequent meeting.

BUDGET IMPACT

Rejection of the bid will have no budget impact.

BACKGROUND

In November 2016, an Invitation for Bids (IFB) was issued on the Public Purchase website and in a local newspaper of general circulation to obtain bids for the Rental, Purchase and Laundering of Work Clothing, Shop Towels and Related Items. Solicitation notifications also were sent to interested bidders. The District received one bid from Aramark Uniform and Career Apparel, LLC (Aramark).

On January 4, 2017, the Board rejected the single bid received from Aramark as non-responsive. Staff advertised a new IFB on the Public Purchase website in accordance with the IFB process described above. The District received one bid as listed below:

Company	Bid Amount
G&K Services, Inc., Hayward, California	\$394,791.46

Upon review by staff and legal counsel, the single bid was found to be non-responsive because the bid contained a contractor's percentage mark-up that exceeded the 20 percent limit imposed by the District. This irregularity cannot be waived and, therefore, the bid must be rejected.

The District's incumbent vendor is Aramark Uniform Services, a Division of Aramark Uniform and Career Apparel, LLC, which was awarded a five-year contract for a total estimated cost of \$269,186. Aramark agreed to an extension of their contract on a month-to-month basis in accordance with their current pricing until December 31, 2017.

ACTION

SIGNIFICANCE

Staff will provide regular updates to the Board in accordance with the approved Legislative Program.

STATE ISSUES

AS OF 3/20/2017:

Governor Jerry Brown and legislative leaders are working to complete a transportation funding package by April 6, when lawmakers leave for spring recess and before the annual budget process dominates the Capitol.

The governor's plan would generate an average of \$4.2 billion annually over 10 years, while Assemblymember Jim Frazier and Senator Jim Beall's transportation funding bills would provide almost \$6 billion a year (Assembly Bill 1 and Senate Bill 1). The Republican funding proposal introduced by Assemblymember Paul Fong generates \$5.6 billion in multi-year funding and \$2.2 billion in one-time revenues.

The governor's office, leadership in the Assembly and Senate, as well as key transportation chairs are meeting on a regular basis to discuss and negotiate a package that would garner the needed support to pass both chambers.

Leadership Change

On March 14, 2017, Senator Patricia Bates (R-Laguna Niguel) was elected leader of the Senate Republican Caucus.

FEDERAL ISSUES

As of 3/20/2017:

On March 16, the Office of Management and Budget published the Administration's Fiscal Year (FY) 2018 "skinny" budget. The budget increases military spending and cuts many other programs, including those at Department of Transportation (DOT). The "full" budget that will include more details about department and program budgets is expected to be released in May.

Information from the skinny budget:

- Limits funding for the Federal Transit Administration's Capital Investment Program (includes the Core Capacity Program) to projects with existing full funding grant agreements only.
- Terminates Federal support for Amtrak's long distance train services, which have long been inefficient and incur the vast majority of Amtrak's operating losses.
- Eliminates funding for the TIGER Discretionary Grant Program.

Although Congress will take this budget proposal under advisement, the House and Senate will ultimately develop their own FY2018 budget and spending bills to be signed into law.

Nominations

On March 7, President Donald Trump announced his intent to nominate Jeffrey Rosen as deputy secretary of the Department of Transportation. Mr. Rosen previously served as general counsel at DOT from 2003 to 2006, and then as general counsel and senior policy adviser at the Office of Management and Budget during the Bush 43 administration. Mr. Rosen is currently a senior partner at Kirkland & Ellis LLP, and his clients have included General Motors and Hyundai. If the Senate confirms Mr. Rosen, he will be responsible for the day-to-day operations of the DOT.

ACTION

Staff proposes that the Committee recommend the Board approve the attached SamTrans Fiscal Year (FY) 2017 – FY 2026 Short Range Transit Plan (SRTP).

SIGNIFICANCE

Staff has prepared the Final SRTP that describes its transit capital and operating plans from FY2017 through FY2026. Major components of a SRTP include:

- Vision, guiding principles, and performance measures
- General system overview of fixed-route and paratransit services
- Service and system evaluation for FY2014 FY2016
- Operations Plan and Budget for FY2017 FY2026
- Capital Improvement Program (CIP) for FY2017 FY2026

At the December 7, 2016 meeting, staff presented to the Board the Draft SRTP, and discussed the above elements of the plan. Since the meeting, staff submitted the Draft SRTP to the Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC) for review. The Final SRTP incorporates the Board-approved FY2016 audited actuals and comments received from the MTC, as appropriate.

The SRTP's operating plan reflects service changes made in 2014 to implement the SamTrans Service Plan and focuses on ongoing cost efficiency measures without additional growth in service levels over the next 10 years. The CIP addresses improvements needed to maintain the system in a state of good repair and to provide quality service to customers through smart investments.

BUDGET IMPACT

This project is currently funded through the FY2016 Capital Budget. No additional funding is needed for adoption of the SRTP and submission to MTC.

BACKGROUND

The SRTP fulfills Federal Transit Administration and MTC regulatory requirements to implement and inform the development of MTC's Regional Transportation Plan and the Transportation Improvement Program so that the San Mateo County Transit District can qualify for State and Federal funding. The goals, objectives, and standards in the SRTP will serve as a basis for the assessment of SamTrans' performance in the MTC's Triennial Performance Audits.

MTC requires that each Bay Area transit operator that receives Federal funding prepare and submit an updated SRTP every two years. The last SRTP update was adopted by the Board in January 2015 (Resolution No. 2015-06) and covered FY2014 – 2023.

STRATEGIC INITIATIVE

Overall, the SRTP is aligned with the vision and goals set forth in the SamTrans Strategic Plan.

Joan Cassman, Legal Counsel, said the District is a member agency/partner with the Peninsula Corridor Joint Powers Board (JPB) and is the arm by which the JPB seeks acquisitions for properties needed for projects.

Director Jeff Gee arrived at 2:02 p.m.

The JPB is a separate entity created by contract between San Francisco, San Mateo and Santa Clara counties, but the contract didn't give the JPB the power of imminent domain. There was a decision made by the Board that if property acquisitions ever required the use of imminent domain each member agency would use their powers to obtain the property.

Ms. Cassman said last year the Board approved a cooperative agreement between the District and the JPB, which outlines the projects coming forward. The Board used its powers of imminent domain back in 2010. The 25th Avenue Grade Separation Project has been in the works for a long time and is a partnership with the JPB and the city of

San Mateo. Ms. Cassman said staff hopes to move this project forward and have certain work done to not interfere in the electrification infrastructure. There is a bid out for the 25th Avenue Grade Separation Project and the JPB will consider award of this contract in May. These RONs are being done now so the property is acquired prior to construction.

REPORT OF CHAIR

Resolution of Appreciation to Past Chair Zoe Kersteen-Tucker

Director Carole Groom said Director Kersteen-Tucker ran very efficient meetings and is always attentive to the public needs.

Director Kersteen-Tucker said a tremendous amount of work was done in 2016 and was a year of accelerated change within the District, around the county and profound changes on the national and international levels. She said the biggest challenge the District faces is transforming into a public agency that is nimbly and effectively evolved to meet this changing world head-on, not to just keep up, but to lead the way. Director Kersteen-Tucker said this transformation requires new sources of revenue, a redefinition of the ways service is delivered and the types of services offered. She said this is a tall order, but one the District is capable of and confident the Board is willing to work on. REPORT OF THE GENERAL MANAGER/CEO - J. Hartnett

Mr. Hartnett reported:

- Recognized Rene Ebro as Bus Operator of the Year.
- Recognized as Daniel Jimenez as Maintenance Employee of the Year.
- Staff is still in the process of obtaining approval of a Full Funding Grant Agreement (FFGA) for the Caltrain electrification project. Caltrain is the only agency in the country that has met and exceeded all requirements for the grant. No grant has ever been rejected ranked as high the electrification grant has been. Staff hopes to have a clear indication when the president's budget comes out in June if the funds will be allocated. The executive director of the Federal Transit Administration has told staff that if this project is in the budget the FFGA will be signed. As of March 1 the Limited Notice to Proceed for the two contractors has expired. Staff has negotiated an extension with both contractors to June 30, but it will cost \$20 million for the extension. No more money will be allocated by the JPB to this project. This amount is to keep the contractors on board at their current price. Staff is going to Washington, D.C. on March 6 to speak to members of Congress and the Senate who have responsibility for allocation of funds. A meeting has been requested with Department of

Transportation Secretary Elaine Chao along with an invitation to come out and look at the project.
