Chair Michelle Buzbee called the meeting to order at 6:31 pm and led the Pledge of Allegiance.

## **PRESENTATIONS**

## **Brown Act and Advocacy on Ballot Measures**

Catherine Groves, Legal Counsel, gave a presentation that provided the fundamental points of the Brown Act and how it applies to communications among CAC members.

Bob Gomez asked about having a telephone meeting with other Committee members. Ms. Groves said the Brown Act concerns prohibiting having a conversation about the business of the agency with a majority of the members (quorum) of a legislative body outside of a publicly noticed meeting. She added that if the topic does not concern the business of the agency, then the communication is not considered a meeting by the Brown Act.

Vice Chair Sonny Koya asked about emailing fewer members than would constitute a quorum. Ms. Groves said that that communication could easily turn into a serial meeting if it gets forwarded to other members.



Ms. Groves said teleconferencing is allowed if a quorum is physically located within the jurisdiction of the legislative body. She said that the teleconferencing location must be noticed and open to the public, and that all votes must be taken by roll call.

Ms. Groves said that meeting topics are limited to what is on the agenda. She said that even if a topic is related, it would be a violation of the Brown Act to discuss it if it is not on the agenda. She said that public comments that are off topic can be responded to briefly and then should be agendized if further discussion is needed. She noted that while legislative bodies have the opportunity to cure violations of the Act at another meeting, such violations contribute to unwanted negative publicity for the agency.

Ms. Groves reviewed exceptions to the rule of not discussing an item that is not on the agenda. She confirmed for Ms. Lacsamana that a new topic someone wishes to discuss must be agendized at a new meeting.

Mr. Gomez asked which entities are subject to the Brown Act. Ms. Groves confirmed that the Act applies to public entities in California.

Ms. Groves confirmed for Chair Buzbee that an ad hoc committee would not quality as a standing committee.

Ms. Groves gave a presentation clarifying the difference between advocating or opposing a ballot measure representing one's personal beliefs versus appearing to represent the position of your agency. She referred specifically to the resolution passed in July on the Get Us Moving (GUM) investment plan, which will culminate in a ballot measure asking for half-cent sales tax increase to address traffic congestion in San Mateo County.

She said that the laws apply to Board, staff, and advisory committees, including the CAC. She said that publicly funded resources (phones, fax machines, etc.) cannot be used to promote voting for or against something. She said that public resources can, however, be used to provide information and education about issues in a neutral, balanced manner. She said that members are allowed to campaign in a private capacity - that is, not representing the agency – not using public time or resources.

Richard Pico asked if a SamTrans employee could donate money to the District and Ms. Groves said yes, as long as it was in the employee's capacity as a private citizen and as long as he was not asked to make a donation. He asked if the Board of Supervisors could poll the public to see if a measure were going to pass. Jessica Epstein, Government and Community Affairs Officer, said that going forward, the District's role in the measure is over.

Chair Buzbee said asked if CAC members could be involved in a campaign. Ms. Groves said they could if they did so in their own private capacity. She added they can identify themselves as Committee members, but that they are not speaking on behalf of the CAC. She clarified for Mr. Pico that while he could say that he advocates for a certain measure, he could not say that the CAC as a whole is for or against that measure.

Vice Chair Koya asked about the majority of votes needed to pass a ballot measure. Ms. Epstein said that the half-cent sales tax measure would require a two-thirds majority to pass and that Proposition 6 would require a 51 percent majority vote.

Ms. Groves confirmed for Mr. Pico that if he had email communications with another Committee member, that is not considered a Brown Act public meeting.



## **Market Segmentation Study Key Findings**

Julian Jest, Market Research Specialist, presented an overview of his research on the composition of SamTrans bus ridership as well as the reasons that non-riders or former riders choose not to use transit.

Vice Chair Koya said he was impressed that 70 percent of riders said they were still willing to ride if the trip were 10 minutes longer.

Ms. Lacsamana said she appreciated the study. She suggested that in the future, riders should be polled about how they safe they feel on transit.

John Baker said he thought it was interesting that 30 percent of survey respondents said they thought riding transit was cheaper than driving a car. Frank Liu said that it was 70 percent of the 28 percent of riders who would continue to ride if the trip duration increased, so the correct figure is 19.6 percent of respondents instead of 30 percent.

Chair Buzbee asked why the statistics in the presentation didn't show all ethnicities. Mr. Jest said the slides only show the top three ethnicities. She asked why ridership is shown to decrease the longer someone has lived in the County. Ms. Ross said she presumed that some prior riders may have moved to less expensive areas, which may be a contributing factor to lower ridership.

## **Coastside Transit Study**

Millie Tolleson, Principal Planner, summarized the study being considered for adoption by the SamTrans Board, which examines the current and future transit needs of Coastside residents.

Vice Chair Koya said some Coastside residents had requested bus shelters in the past. He asked if shelters were being considered.

Jason Galisatus asked if reducing bus size would result in a cost savings. Ms. Tolleson said bus size doesn't save money. She said they were exploring using microtransit or ondemand service, which does use smaller vehicles and would generate a cost savings.

Mr. Gomez commented on the lack of bus shelters in East Palo Alto. Ms. Tolleson said the upcoming business plan includes an analysis of bus stops and amenities, and said that the amenities such as shelters depend on the ridership of a stop. Ms. Ross concurred that certain standards must be met for a stop to quality for a bus pad or shelter.

#### **CAC RETREAT**

Chair Buzbee said that she and Vice Chair Koya had been co-facilitating the plan for the CAC retreat. She said the proposed time is 4:00-6:00 pm on Wednesday, September 26, prior to the CAC meeting beginning at 6:30 pm. Ms. Ross said she would reserve the Auditorium.

Allie Juarez asked Chair Buzbee if she and Vice Chair Koya would be soliciting ideas for the agenda from the Committee. Chair Buzbee said that all suggestions were welcome and members should email them to the CAC secretary.



#### SAMTRANS STAFF UPDATE

#### SamTrans Performance Statistics for June 2018

Ms. Ross summarized the June performance statistics:

Average Weekday Ridership – 33,320 On-Time Performance – 78.587% Complaints – 178 MBSC – 25,470 Tokens – 15,537 (Adult)/14,986 (Youth) Did Not Operate – 128

Vice Chair Koya noted that the youth token numbers were down due to school being out. Nancy Lacsamana said that adult token numbers were almost half of what they were for June 2017. Ms. Ross said she would check the numbers and report back to the Committee.

#### CAC MEMBER COMMENTS/REQUESTS

Mr. Liu recommended not having the KX route stop at the San Bruno BART station during rush hours. Patrick Blankenship, Manager of Scheduling and Planning, said they would be doing an evaluation of the merging of the KX and 398 routes. Ms. Ross said that there are KX patrons that use the San Bruno BART stop. Mr. Liu suggested that another alternative, especially during rush hours, would be to have the KX exit US-101 at I-380 instead of at San Bruno Avenue. Mr. Baker said if the KX exit switched to I-380, then it would miss the San Bruno Caltrain station stop.

Vice Chair Koya discussed some of the shortcomings of merging the KX and 398 routes. Ms. Ross said that by expanding Route 398, the District is providing more service to more people. Vice Chair Koya said he felt there was a lack of public outreach prior to the merge of KX and 398.

Mr. Liu expressed his gratitude for having the opportunity to part of the Committee for that last 26 months. He noted that Uber and Lyft are the first choice for east-west transit and thought that the District should try to become competitive in serving this sector.

Mr. Baker said he would like to have a statement of support item for the upcoming traffic congestion ballot measure on the next meeting agenda. Ms. Epstein said to wait until the measure has been assigned a ballot number before taking any action. Ms. Ross suggested putting comments of support in the minutes rather than approving a resolution. Chair Buzbee would check with Ms. Ross offline about the proper procedure to take action on the measure.

Staff and members congratulated Mr. Liu, who is leaving the Committee to start school at UC Berkeley in August.



#### LIAISON REPORTS

#### SamTrans Board of Directors

Chair Buzbee summarized highlights of the July Board meeting, including the unanimous approval of the ordinance to impose a sales tax to implement the San Mateo County Congestion Relief Plan. She said she would update the Committee on the the ad hoc committee formed to discuss the negotiating agreement between the District, Facebook, and Plenary Concessions. She said that Jim Hartnett, General Manager/CEO, had announced the release of the SamTrans mobile app in September.

## SamTrans Accessibility Advisory Committee

Chair Buzbee asked the membership if they wanted to continue reporting out on this committee since the monthly accessibility and paratransit report is available in the agenda packets on the Board calendar website. Hearing no objections, she said that the accessibility advisory committee report would no longer be on the CAC agenda.

She said she wanted to add regular updates on the Community Engagement Committee meetings, beginning with the August 29 agenda.
